Land Acknowledgement

Every community owes its existence and vitality to generations from around the world who contributed their hopes, dreams, and energy to making the history that led to this moment. In Minnesota, we are standing on the ancestral lands of the Dakota people. We want to acknowledge the history of this land, including the Dakota, the Ojibwe, the Ho-Chunk, and the other nations of people who also called this place home. Native peoples were removed unjustly, and we in this space are the beneficiaries of that removal. At MDH, as we understand that land is related to health, we want to be a good steward of the land we are on. This acknowledgement is just one piece of that. We understand the systemic racism, historic trauma, and genocide that has impacted Indigenous communities and peoples in our state.

We recognize that a land acknowledgement is a first step. We support this action with resources and shared decision-making to meet Tribal public health priorities and needs. With our Indigenous neighbors and coworkers, we can advance health equity and work to ensure all communities across the state are thriving and all people have what they need to be healthy.

We encourage state employees and the public to research the history of the lands we are on and if you are able, find Native-led events to attend, organizations to support, and causes to champion.

Tribal-State Relations Statement

The State of Minnesota is home to 11 federally recognized Indian Tribes with elected Tribal government officials. The State of Minnesota acknowledges and supports the unique political status of Tribal Nations across Minnesota and their absolute right to existence, self-governance, and self-determination. This unique relationship with federally recognized Indian Tribes is cemented by the Constitution of the United States, treaties, statutes, case law, and agreements. The State of Minnesota and Tribal governments across Minnesota significantly benefit from working together, learning from one another, and partnering where possible.

The Minnesota Department of Health recognizes, values, and celebrates the vibrant and unique relationships between the 11 Tribal Nations and the State of Minnesota. Partnerships formed through government-to-government relationships with these Tribes will effectively address health disparities and lead to better health outcomes for all of Minnesota.



What is the Renovate, Repair, and Paint Program?

Renovate, Repair, and Paint Program

- The Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) lead-based paint rule, which aims to protect the public from lead-based paint hazards associated with renovation, repair and painting activities in pre-1978 housing, including child-occupied facilities.
- These activities can create hazardous lead dust when surfaces with lead paint, even from many decades ago, are disturbed.
- The rule requires workers to be trained in the use of lead-safe work practices, and requires renovation, repair, and painting firms to be EPAcertified.
- These requirements became effective in April 2010.

Renovate, Repair, and Paint Program (continued)

- EPA enforces RRP nationally from one of its 10 regional offices. For Minnesota, this is Region 5 in Chicago.
- Currently, 15 states, and the Minnesota Chippewa Tribe Bois Forte, have received EPA authorization to administer and enforce RRP.
- The MN Legislature directed MDH to adopt rules governing RRP in order to administer and enforce the program.
- MDH intends to propose these rules in 2025.

Crosswalk

What is the Crosswalk?

 The crosswalk compares EPA's RRP program regulations and the relevant sections of the federal Lead-based Paint Activities regulations with MDH draft proposed rules.

Why did we create this document?

 For states or Tribes seeking program authorization, this document is needed to comply with EPA's requirement "to provide an analysis and comparison of MDH's program that compares MDH's program rules to the federal program."

Differences - MDH vs EPA

Fees

- Annual certification and permit fees under Minnesota Statutes, section 144.9505 will apply once MDH begins administering the program.
- These fees are set in statute by the Legislature and cannot be amended in rule.
- EPA and MDH will notify existing license and certification holders in Minnesota of the change.

Program Fees

Records

MDH is requiring that certified renovation firms maintain the same records as EPA, with some exceptions:

- Most of the documentation is maintained in a work plan that must be available on-site.
- Sign-in/sign-out sheet (workplan, page 9 10).
- At the end of the project, this documentation becomes the primary portion of the project report.

On-site Inspections

On-site inspections will occur from time to time. For this reason, certified renovation firms must have project documentation on-site for review by MDH inspectors. Documentation can be in hard copy, or provided electronically (tablet/iPad, laptop).

MDH will perform on-site inspections:

- When asked by a certified renovation firm.
- If MDH receives a complaint or tip.
- If MDH is otherwise informed of improper work practices or other concerns at a project site.

Work Practices

Use of water

- MDH is requiring the use of water (ie misting surfaces) when disturbing all painted surfaces to be disturbed during renovation to prevent the spread of dust and debris.
- This practice is consistent with HUD guidelines and is also recommended by EPA in its guidance materials.

Waste removal

 MDH incorporated EPA's own guidance on collecting and containing renovation waste in a bag and sealing the bag with a gooseneck knot.

Notice of Hearing

Notice of Hearing

What is the Purpose of a Notice of Hearing?

It is legal notification that the Department is planning to adopt the proposed rules after a public hearing.

The Notice of Hearing contains information relevant to the rulemaking including:

- Subject and scope of rules
- Hearing date
- Hearing location (virtual)
- How to obtain copies of the rule draft and Statement of Need and Reasonableness
- Comment period duration
- How to comment
- Agency contact person

Notice of Hearing - continued

- You and/or your organization will be notified by email.
- Publication of the Notice of Hearing starts the official 30-day comment period.





Commenting Tips

Providing Comments

- At a minimum, you can state that you support or oppose the whole rule.
- For specific comments, it is helpful to provide the specific citation(s).
- Describe what concerns you and why.
- Provide, if possible, alternative language that addresses your concern.

Things to remember when commenting

- Comments accepted during the 30day comment period after the Notice of Hearing has been published are part of the public record.
- Administrative Law Judge reviews all comments when preparing the Order on Review of Rules.
