

Minnesota Human Trafficking and Exploitation Prevention and Response

Minnesota's Human Trafficking Prevention and Response approach spans a statewide network of multidisciplinary partners, including organizations that provide services, housing, shelter, outreach, and support to victim/survivors of human trafficking and exploitation (sex and labor).

This response includes services for victims of labor trafficking and exploitation of all ages and genders. The Safe Harbor program increases awareness and identification of the commercial sexual exploitation and sex trafficking of youth through age 24. The Safe Harbor law protects youth under age 18 from being arrested or prosecuted for prostitution.

The Safe Harbor response

Minnesota Safe Harbor has a strong network of services with twelve Regional Navigators, including two in Tribal Nations, who direct youth through age 24 and providers to specialized services, housing, and shelter. Regional Navigators are available to increase local capacity and awareness by training communities. Using state and federal funds, Safe Harbor supports Tribal Nations, state-level partners, and community-based services, as well as survivor subject matter experts who provide guidance on program implementation. Responding to labor trafficking and exploitation

Minnesota's response to labor trafficking and exploitation, supported by state and federal funds, includes six programs to address the supportive service and legal needs of victims/survivors of all ages and genders. Commercial sexual exploitation

Commercial sexual exploitation occurs when someone exchanges sex for anything of value or a promise of something of value such as money, drugs, food, shelter, rent, or higher status in a gang or group. Another person may or may not be involved in arranging this exchange.

Sex trafficking

Sex trafficking is a type of commercial sexual exploitation that involves the prostitution of an individual in which a third person – not the buyer or the victim – facilitates or profits. MN Statutes 609.321-609.322.

Labor trafficking and exploitation

Labor trafficking includes debt bondage or forced labor or services. Debt bondage means someone is under another's control or debt and the debt cannot be paid back with reasonable work due to fraud by the trafficker. MN Statutes 609.281-609.282. Labor exploitation involves violations of laws protecting how workers are treated, including how much and when someone is paid, child labor, and health and safety in the workplace.

State agency partners

Safety through child welfare system responses

Sex trafficking of a minor is a mandatory child protection response. Child protection must be notified of all youth victims of sex trafficking, whether or not their families are involved in the trafficking. Child welfare agencies must investigate reports of sexual exploitation by caregivers and offer a voluntary child welfare response for all victims/survivors of sexual exploitation by non-caregivers. Services focus on youth safety while connecting them to trauma-informed, specialized services. The law enforcement response

Law enforcement plays a critical role in the anti-human trafficking movement. The Bureau of Criminal Apprehension (BCA) in the Minnesota Department of Public Safety (DPS) coordinates the Minnesota Human Trafficking Investigators Task Force and Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force (ICAC), offers Victims' Relations, and works closely with law enforcement agencies statewide. The Office of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Relatives in the Minnesota Department of Public Safety Office of Justice Programs (OJP) provides support to families with murdered or missing relatives, and offers educational and awareness trainings for youth, community, and professionals on prevention and available supportive services. MMIR provides statewide data analysis on MMIR statistics and a reward fund. The Office of Missing and Murdered Black Women and Girls in the Minnesota Department of Public Safety Office of Justice Programs offers support for families of missing or murdered Black women and girls, and provides training to youth, community, and professionals on prevention and services. MMBWG provides statewide data analysis on the epidemic of missing and murdered Black women and girls, and provides grants to organizations designed to mitigate the harm experienced by Black women and girls.
