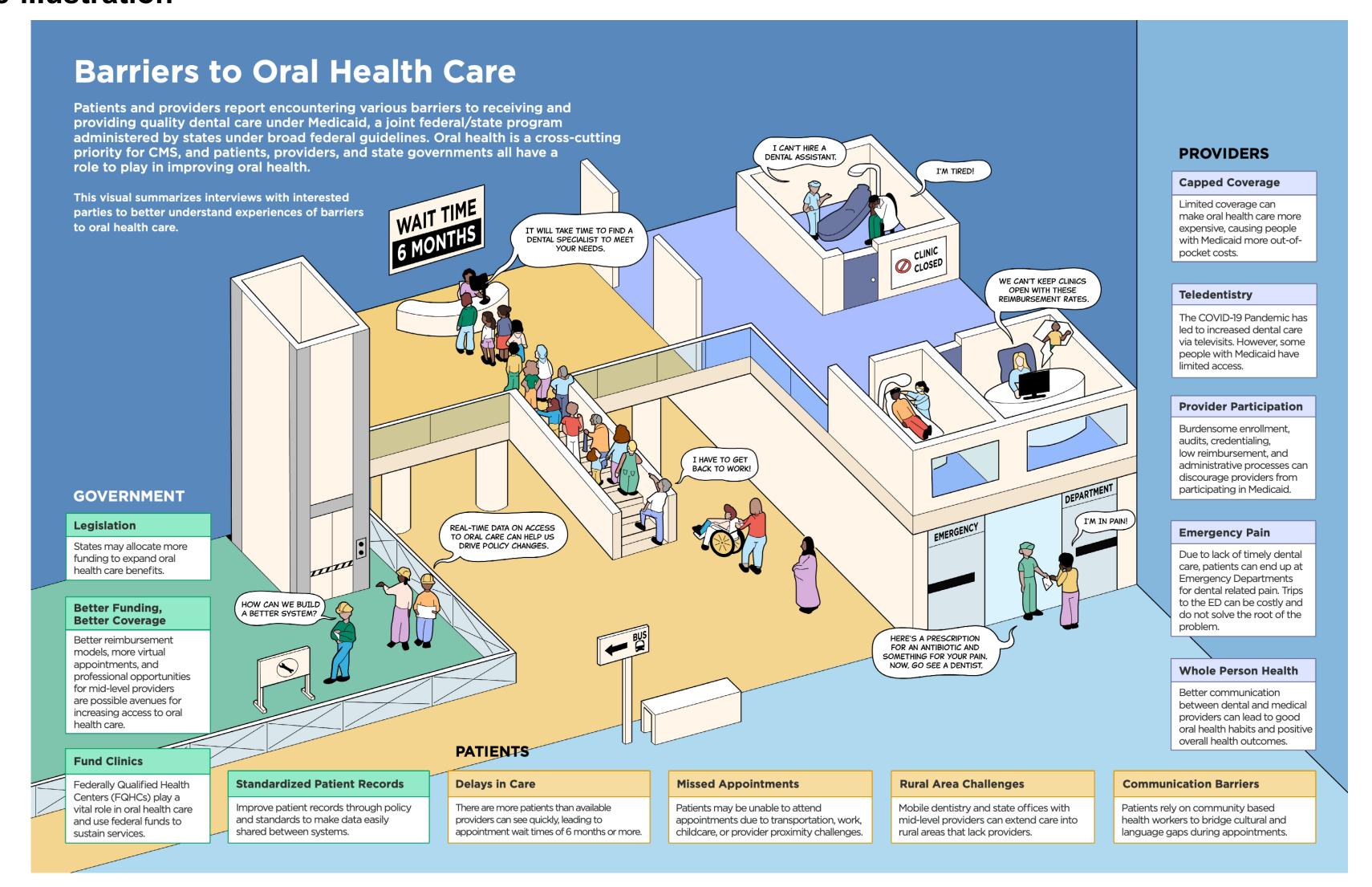
- The mouth is part of the body

- Integrates dental care into health care homes

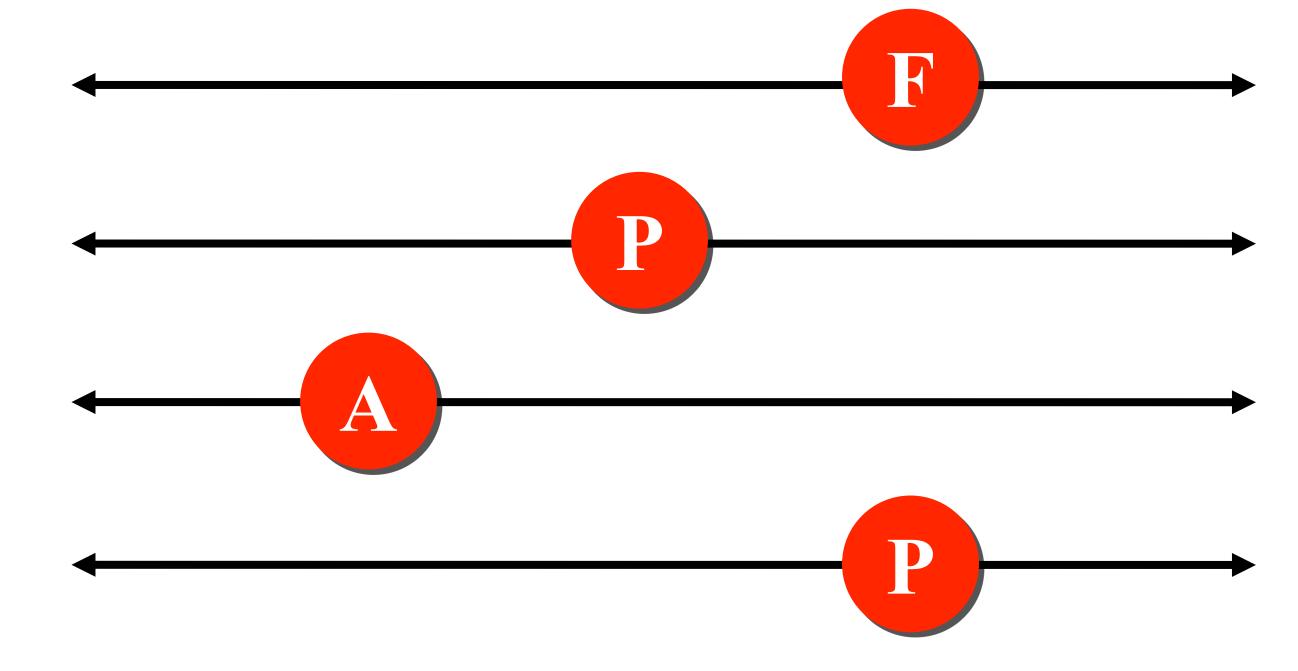


Patient Reported Outcomes - Oral Health Impact Profile

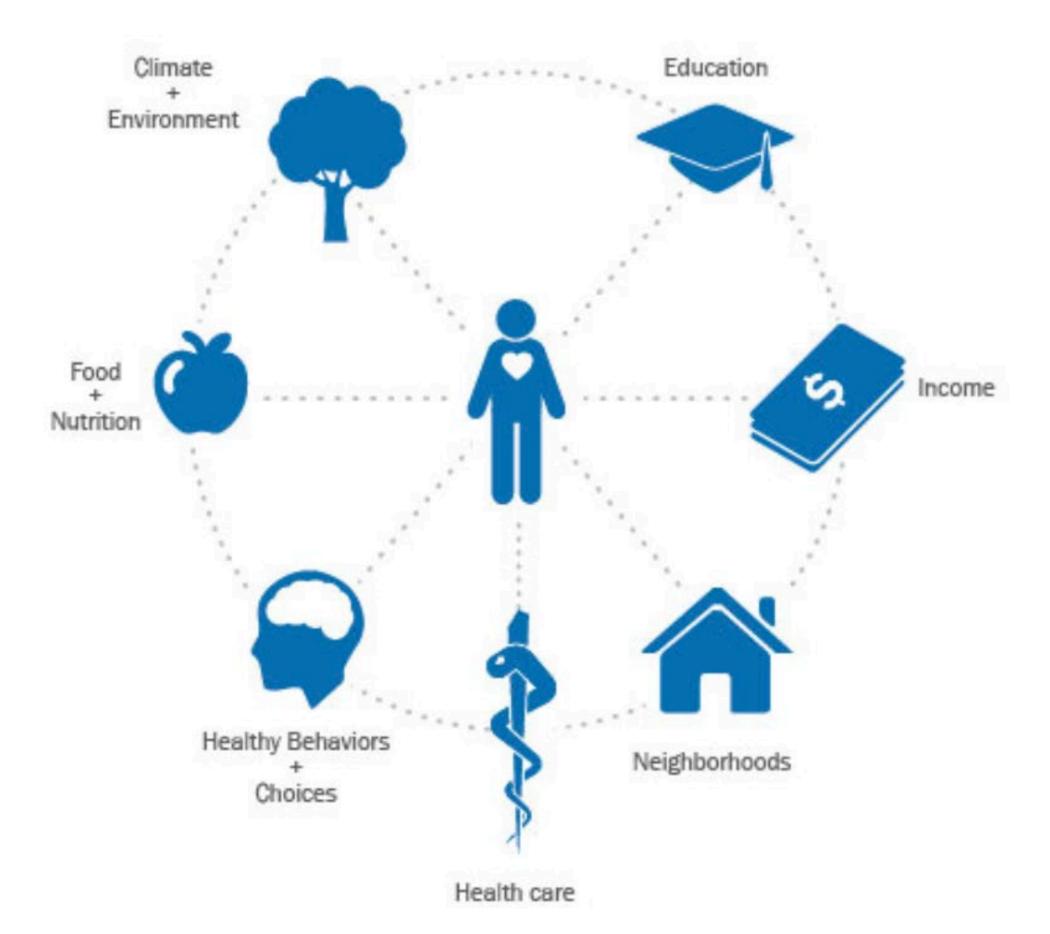

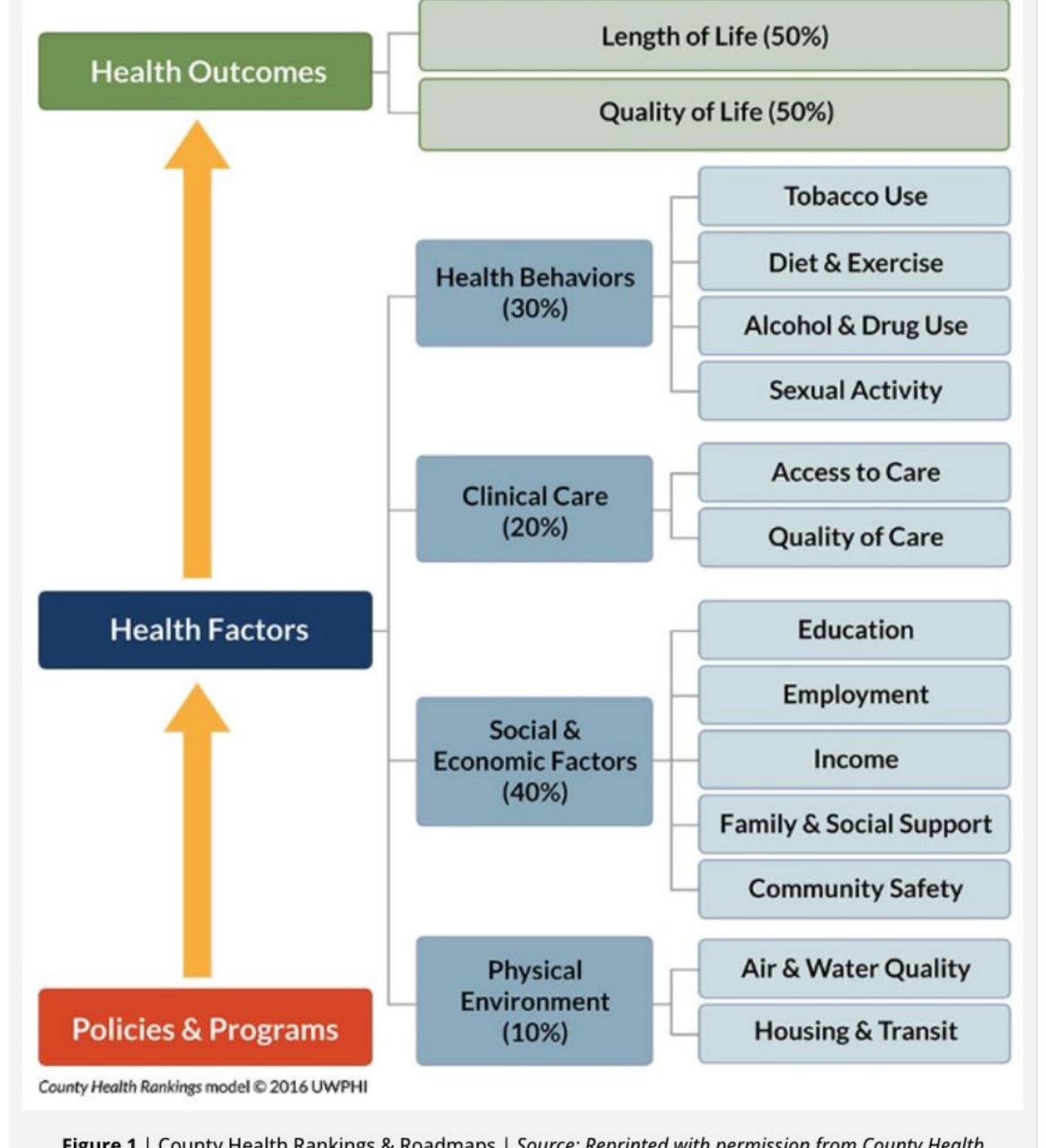
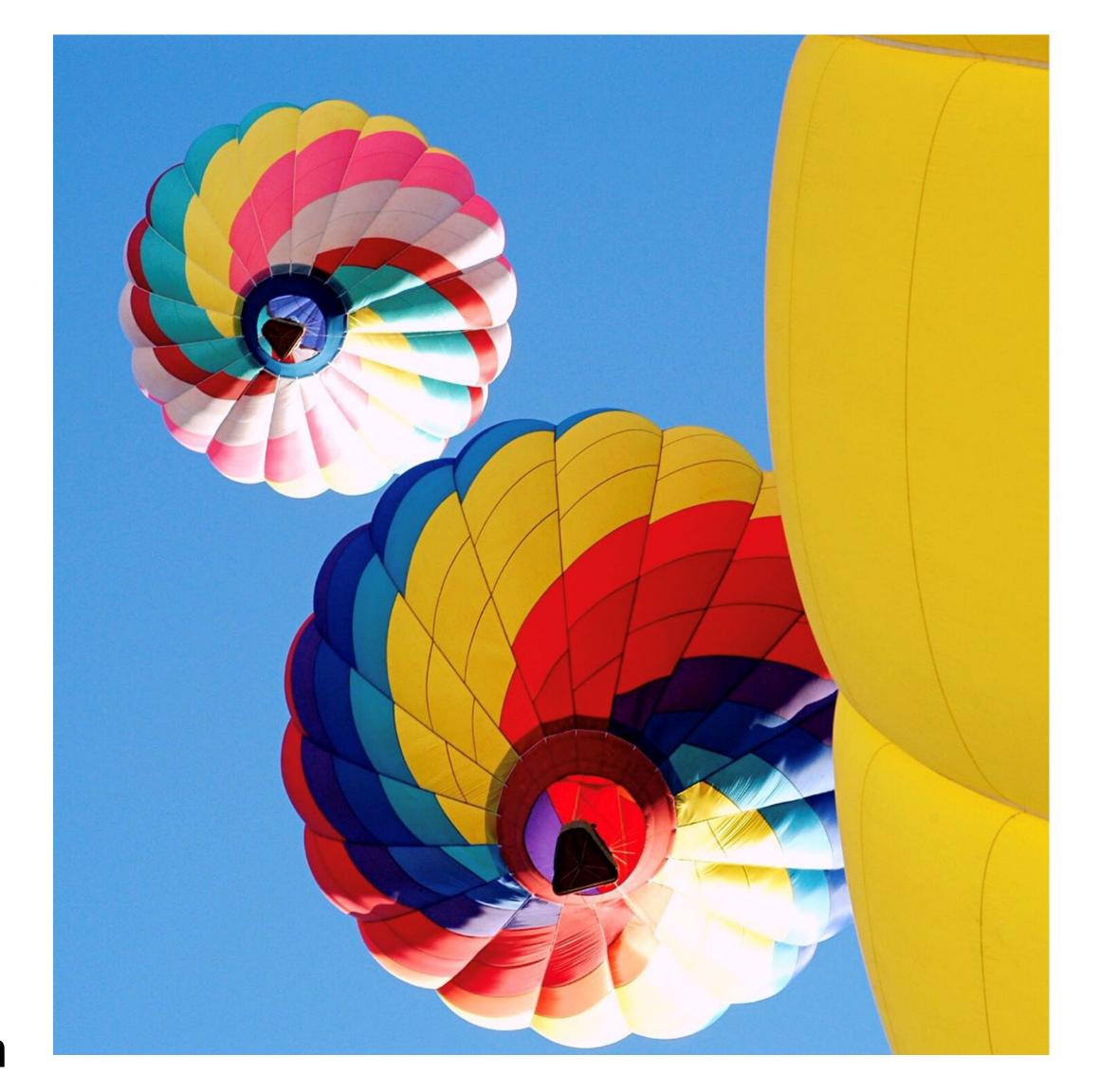


Figure 1 | County Health Rankings & Roadmaps | Source: Reprinted with permission from County Health Rankings & Roadmaps, http://www.countyhealthrankings.org/our-approach (accessed July 18, 2017).

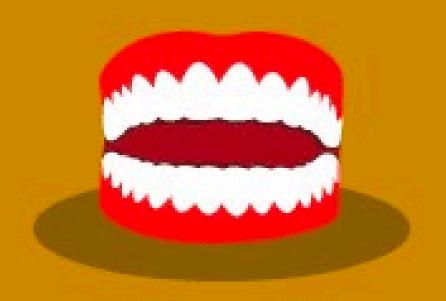


Meet Your Mouth

Your Mouth and The Golden Years

Older adults are more vulnerable to oral health problems like tooth decay, cavities, gum disease, and oral cancers.

After decades of eating and drinking, your teeth and its enamel break down and become weaker.

- 96% of adults aged 65+ have a cavity - 28% have untreated tooth decay - 68% have gum disease

More Information



These ailments are even more likely if you are an older adult who smokes.

Protect your teeth by going into the dentist twice a year, brushing every day with a fluoride toothpaste, flossing, using mouth wash, and alerting your dentist with any concerns you have about your teeth.

Oral health can become more strained with other health conditions, such as diabetes, chronic smoking, heart disease, and others.

Your Mouth and Diabetes

People with diabetes have a higher chance of having periodontal (gum) disease, an infection of the gum and bone that hold the teeth in place.

HPV, or human papillomavirus, is a common virus that can cause six cancers later in life. You can protect your child from these cancers with HPV vaccine beginning at age 9 years.

HPV infections are very common. Nearly everyone will get HPV at some point in their lives.

HPV vaccination can prevent over 90% of cancers caused by HPV.

HPV can cause cancers of the: Cervix, vagina, and vulva in women, penis in men, anus in both men and women, back of the throat, including the base of the tongue and tonsils (oropharynx), in both men and women.

HPV Vaccine

- HPV vaccine is recommended for routine vaccination at age 11 or 12 years. (Vaccination can be started at age 9.)
- ACIP also recommends vaccination for everyone through age 26 years if not adequately vaccinated when younger.
- HPV vaccination is given as a series of either two or three doses, depending on age at initial vaccination.
- For adults ages 27 through 45 years, clinicians can consider discussing HPV vaccination with people who are most likely to benefit.

Collaborative Dental Hygiene Practice

- Collaborative dental hygiene practice (CDHP) in community settings (Minnesota Statutes 150A.10, Subd. 1a) authorizes Minnesota licensed dental hygienists to practice within a community-focused model resulting in more people with access to preventive services and in finding a dental home.
- Dental hygienists can effectively provide "coordinated care" to underresourced populations in non-traditional health care settings.
- The CDHP workforce model was authorized by the Minnesota Legislature in 2001.
- Services may be performed by the dental hygienist without the presence of a dentist and without a prior exam of the patient by a dentist.

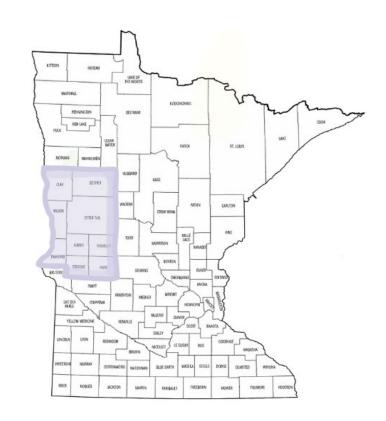

Poor Oral Health: a Public Health Crisis

Highly prevalent in MN; impacting all ages, genders, & socioeconomic backgrounds

Affects an individual's quality of life & potentially lifelong prosperity

Poor Oral

Health*

Disproportionately affects certain social determinants of health; creates broader health inequities

Addressing this issue could contribute to the management & prevention of certain systemic conditions

Poor Oral Health: Early Childhood Development & Dental Disease

- Cavities are the <u>most common chronic disease</u>
 <u>of childhood</u> in the United States.
- Untreated cavities can cause pain and infections, leading to <u>difficulties with eating</u>, <u>speaking</u>, <u>playing</u>, <u>and learning</u>.
- Children with poor oral health often miss more school and receive lower grades compared to their peers who maintain good oral health.*



State of Children's Oral Health – National Data

- >51 million school hours are missed each year due to dental-related illness
- Over 164 million work hours are lost annually due to dental disease



- Pediatric dental disease is a primary reason for emergency room visits for children
- ~17 million children in America have no dental care each year.

Systems & Policy Change Strategies

Designated Community Support

- Child & Teen Check-up Program: oral health collaborations
- Incorporating oral health care & prevention as part of newborn & early childhood home visiting programs + well child visits
 - Providing additional support & resources regarding oral health
- Educating employers on impacts of oral health to workforce
 - & the importance of dental insurance coverage

State & Local Partnerships: SHIP Programs & School Wellness Committees

- Providing oral health resources & support for School Nurses & staff
- Adding 'Oral Health' to Schools' annual Wellness Workplans & District-wide policies:
 - 4 districts have imbedded these policies
 - more pending
- Vaping education & Positive
 Community Norms social media campaign for vaping cessation

The objective of the expanded Flexible Staffing concept is to incrementally increase the dental workforce by utilizing <u>all areas of the dental workforce</u> to help offset the increased need for dental professionals created by this project

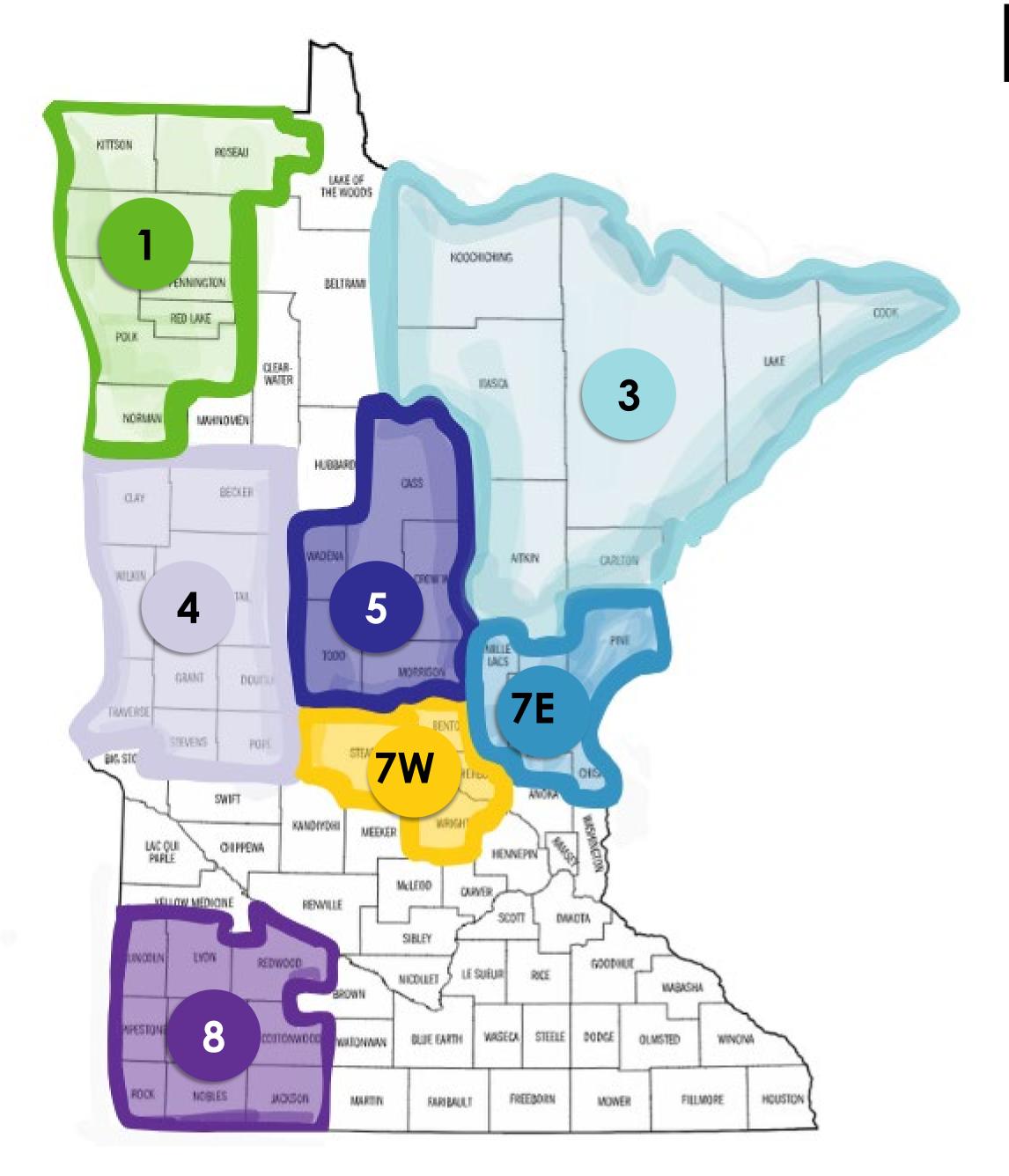


Top 10 Strategies for Promoting & Improving Oral Health

- 1) Prevention: "An ounce of Prevention is Worth a Pound of Cure." (Benjamin Franklin)
- 2) Education "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world." (Nelson Mandela)
- 3) Collaboration: "Coming together is a beginning; staying together is progress; and working together is success." (Henry Ford)
- 4) Pediatricians, primary care physicians and many others have an opportunity to increase their knowledge of children's oral health, incorporate it into their daily clinical routine, and improve the overall health of children. *Assign someone to attend the monthly Medical-Dental Community Conversations!*
- 5) Encourage Dental Visits by Age 1: Early identification of dental concerns can eliminate most dental diseases in the future.

Top 10 Strategies for Promoting & Improving Oral Health

- 6) Educate about the importance of fluoride: Fluoride provides a key role in preventing and controlling caries.
- 7) Promote good oral health and healthy eating from birth. Good oral health and nutrition habits start with young children,.
- 8) Seek and Offer resources: Help families with young children find dental care, especially those utilizing Minnesota Health Care Programs.
- 9) Support and initiate mobile dental clinics in your community which are offered through local, regional and statewide non-profit dental providers.
